YOU DON'T WANT A UNICORN! Discussion Questions for REACH Partners


- 🢬 Before Reading:
- If you could have any pet—real or imaginary—what would it be?
- What do you think unicorns are like? Are they always magical and fun, or could they be tricky to take care of?
- After Reading:
- How does the boy feel when he first gets his unicorn? How do his feelings change as the story goes on?
- What are some of the biggest problems caused by having a pet unicorn?
- Can you think of a time when you thought you wanted something, but it turned out differently than you expected?
- What lesson do you think the boy learned by the end?
- If you could rewrite the story, what pet would the boy wish for instead? What kinds of problems might that pet cause?
- 器 Family Connection:
- Talk about the pets you've had (or wanted to have). What responsibilities come with having a pet?
- Imagine you could create a perfect pet—what would it be like? What rules would it follow?

Discussion Questions for Classroom Teachers & Librarians

- 💡 Before Reading:
- The title says You Don't Want a Unicorn!—why do you think the author chose that title? What might happen in this story?
- What do you know about unicorns from other books, movies, or stories?
- 🔋 After Reading:
- What are some of the funny or unexpected things that happen when the boy gets a unicorn?
- If you were the narrator, what advice would you give the boy before he made his wish?
- Why do you think the boy throws another coin in the fountain at the end? What do you think he wished for?
- How does this story teach us about thinking before we make a big decision? Can you think of a real-life situation where this lesson applies?
- Classroom Extension Ideas:
- Creative Writing: Have students write their own "You Don't Want A..." story about another mythical creature (dragon, mermaid, yeti, etc.).
- STEM Challenge: Design a "Unicorn-Proof House" that could survive a unicorn's messy magic!

- Baking soda
- Vinegar
- Gel food colors
- Ice Cube Tray
- Baking Pan with sides
- 2 Drinking glasses





Layered Unicorn Handsoap

Let's talk about some of the chaos unicorns create in the book *You DON'T want a Unicorn!* by Ame Dyckman. Unicorns can be messy, destructive, and downright impossible to clean up after! And let's be honest—some of our experiments and crafts in this issue might get a little messy, too. So, if your "unicorn" needs to wash up after a magical mess, make Layered Unicorn Hand Soap. Not only does it make clean-up fun, but it's also a great way to teach kids about density in liquids!

Density is how much "stuff" (matter) is packed into a space. Liquids with different densities don't mix easily—heavier ones sink while lighter ones float. In our Unicorn Hand Soap, the clear gel soap is the heaviest, so it stays at the bottom. The blue gel soap is a bit lighter and sits on top. Finally, the foam soap and baby oil are the lightest, so they float. This is the same reason oil and water don't mix.

You'll Need:

- A clear soap bottle with pump
- Clear Gel soap like Seventh Generation Liquid Hand Soap Fragrance Free & Clean Unscented Hand Soap Clear (for the bottom layer)
- Liquid Based Skin-safe Soap Colorant (find on Amazon)
- Blue gel soap like Dial Complete Antibacterial Liquid Hand Soap, Spring Water, Blue (for the middle layer)
- Clear Foam soap (for the top layer)
- Baby oil (to create a separate floating layer)
- Tiny soap confetti (shave up some old bar soap with a grater) or floating mini unicorn-themed toys (optional, but extra fun!)

Instructions:

Bottom Layer (Clear Gel Soap + Color!)

Pour clear gel soap into the bottom third of your clear bottle. Add a drop or two of Liquid Based Skin-safe Soap Colorant (pink or purple work great) and gently swirl.

Sprinkle in tiny soap confetti for a pop of color!

Middle Layer (Blue Gel Soap)

Slowly pour the blue gel hand soap on top of the clear layer. Be careful to pour gently so the layers don't mix!

Top Layer (Foam Soap & Baby Oil)

Pump a layer of foam soap on top to create a light, fluffy layer. Add in a drop or two of another color of the Liquid Based Skin-safe Soap Colorant if you'd like, or leave clear.

Slowly pour in a thin layer of baby oil—this keeps the foam layer separate.

Add the Fun!

If using floating mini toys, carefully drop them in before sealing the bottle. Gently tip the bottle back and forth to see the layers stay separated!

How It Works:

The densest layer (gel soap) stays at the bottom.

The lighter gel soap sits on top of it without mixing.

The foam soap and baby oil float at the top because they are the least dense!

Fluffy Unicorn

Ingredients:

- 1 cup white school glue
- 3 cups shaving cream (foam, not gel)
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 tablespoon saline solution (must contain boric acid and sodium borate)
- Food coloring (assorted colors for a unicorn effect)
- Fine glitter (optional, for added sparkle)

Instructions:

- 1. Prepare the Base:
 - In a large mixing bowl, combine 1 cup of white school glue and 3 cups of shaving cream. Stir gently until the mixture is smooth and well combined.
- 2. Add Color and Sparkle:
 - Divide the mixture evenly into separate bowls, depending on how many colors you wish to create.
 - Add a few drops of food coloring to each bowl, stirring until the color is evenly distributed. For a magical touch, sprinkle in fine glitter and mix thoroughly.

3. Incorporate the Activator:

- To each bowl, add 1/2 teaspoon of baking soda and mix well.
- Gradually add 1 tablespoon of saline solution to each mixture, stirring continuously. The slime will begin to form and pull away from the sides of the bowl.
- 4. Knead the Slime:
 - Once the mixture becomes difficult to stir, remove it from the bowl and begin kneading with your hands. If the slime is too sticky, add a few more drops of saline solution and continue kneading until it reaches the desired consistency.

Tips:

- For best results, use white school glue and foam shaving cream. Gel shaving cream may not yield the same fluffy texture.
- Ensure the saline solution contains boric acid and sodium borate, as these are essential for the slime to form properly.
- Store the slime in an airtight container to maintain its fluffiness and prevent drying out.

Always supervise children during this activity and ensure they wash their hands thoroughly after playing with the slime.
