

Discussion Questions

- 1. What do you think Ella Bella means when she says the farm is "too plain" and "uninteresting"?
- 2. How does Ella Bella try to make the farm more interesting? Do you think her ideas are good?
- 3. Why does Shania not want to change her appearance at first? How do her friends react to her decision?
- 4. Why do you think Ella Bella changes her mind about making everything fancy? What makes her realize she had it "all wrong"?
- 5. How do the animals make amends with Shania after their jokes hurt her feelings? What does Shania do to show she forgives them?
- 6. What does Shania's decision to shear her wool and make scarves for her friends teach us about being true to ourselves and accepting others for who they are?
- 7. Have you ever felt pressured to be like someone else or change something about yourself to fit in? How did you handle that situation?
- 8. What do you think the animals learned about friendship and acceptance?

Reflective Conversation

Use the story as a springboard for deeper conversations about values, kindness, and embracing differences.

Questions for Youngest Readers

- 1. Count how many times the little blue bird shows up in the book.
- 2. What color are Ella Bella's boots?
- 3. What color is Purcella's bow?
- 4. What color is Shania's scarf on the last page?
- 5. Count how many red flowers are on the last page.



REACH Distance Activity: Fancy Farm Animal Greeting Cards

Materials Needed:

- Cardstock, construction or blank paper
- Markers, crayons, or colored pencils
- Scissors
- Glue
- Optional: stickers, sequins, glitter, or other decorative materials

Instructions:

1. Designing the Cards:

- Fold cardstock/construction/paper in half to form a card
- Choose a farm animal character from the story to draw on your card (Ella Bella Bovine, Shania the sheep, Delilah the duck, or Purcella the pig).
- Using markers, crayons, or colored pencils, draw your chosen animal on the front of the card.

2. Adding Details:

- After drawing the animal, add additional decorations using stickers, sequins, glitter, or other decorative materials.
- Inside the card, write a message, such as a favorite memory, a joke, or a kind message of love and appreciation.

3. Sharing the Cards:

- Once the cards are complete, mail the cards to one another.
- When the cards are received, they will be a special keepsake of your shared reading & crafting experience.

This craft allows REACH partners to connect creatively and share a meaningful activity, even from a distance.




Sing these songs together & make up your own verses too:

Fancy Farm Paper Plate Puppets

Materials Needed:

- Paper plates
- Construction paper (various colors
- Markers, crayons or paint
- Scissors
- Glue
- Popsicle sticks
- Various decorations like sequins, feathers, glitter, googly eyes, coton balls, buttons, etc.
- tape (scotch and masking if available)

Instructions:

- 1. Choose which farm animals you'd like to make (e.g., cow, pig, sheep, etc.).
- 2. Fold your paper plate in half to use as the body of your animal.
- 3. Use markers, crayons, paint or construction paper to color the paper plate to match the animal you've chosen.
- 4. Cut out shapes from construction paper to create features for your animal (e.g., ears, snout, tail).
- 5. Glue or tape the construction paper features onto the paper plate to complete the look of your animal.
- 6. Attach a popsicle stick (a sturdy straw or a pencil will work too) to the back of the paper plate using masking tape or glue, leaving enough space for a handle.
- 7. Once the glue is dry, your Fancy Farm Animal Paper Plate Puppet is ready to use! Use it to act out scenes from the book or create your own farm adventures.

Be-You-tiful Me! Classroom Writing Activity

Objective: To encourage students to reflect on their unique qualities and write a story or poem celebrating their individuality.

Materials Needed: Pencils, crayons/markers, optional: copies of the next page for each student or blank paper.

Activity Steps:

Introduction: Begin by reading & discussing the story of *Moo La La Ti Da!* with the students. Talk about how each character learns to embrace their uniqueness and appreciate the differences in others.

Brainstorming: Have students brainstorm a list of things that make them unique. Encourage them to think about their talents, interests, and personality traits.

Writing: Using the following prompts, ask students to write a short story or poem about themselves, focusing on what makes them special.

- What are some things you love to do?
- What makes you different from your friends?
- How do you express your creativity?
- What are you proud of about yourself?

Illustrating: After writing, students can illustrate their stories or poems. They can draw pictures of themselves engaging in their favorite activities or showcasing their unique qualities.

Sharing: Provide time for students to share their writing and illustrations with the class. Encourage them to celebrate each other's uniqueness and offer positive feedback.

Reflection: Conclude the activity with a discussion about the importance of embracing individuality and respecting differences in others. Encourage students to continue to be proud of who they are and to always celebrate their "be-you-tiful" selves.

This activity not only reinforces the themes of *Moo La La Ti Da!* but also promotes self-confidence, creativity, and empathy in students.
