

- 6. What kind of noises did Axel hear during the storm?


Prompts to Dig Deeper

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Bookish Ways to Celebrate July's Bookish Days



Try any (or all!) of these fun, easy ways to REACH out and read together all month long:

July is Read an Almanac Month – Check the moon phase or weather forecast together, then draw a picture of what the sky might look like that night.


JULY 11 – E. B. White's Birthday – Read a favorite quote from Charlotte's Web, then go on a "word web" hunt to find kind words around your home.

JULY 21 – Ernest Hemingway's Birthday – Try writing a tiny six-word story—fun for even the youngest storytellers!

JULY 28 – Beatrix Potter's Birthday – Have a tea party with stuffed animals and read a Peter Rabbit tale (bonus: draw your own animal character!).

JULY 30 – Paperback Book Day / Neville Longbottom's Birthday – Visit a local library or bookshop and let everyone pick a paperback to enjoy.

JULY 31 – J.K. Rowling & Harry Potter's Birthday – Celebrate with a Harry Potter read-aloud, a house sorting, or by making a "spell" for courage, kindness, or calm.





Why Re-read Storm Trucks? And Why Just One Book a Month?

You may wonder why REACH focuses on just one featured book each month. It's intentional—and it's powerful. Young children thrive on repetition. Hearing the same story again and again isn't just something they enjoy—it's how they learn.

Re-reading builds vocabulary, reinforces story structure, and helps kids connect more deeply with characters and emotions. Each time through, they notice something new, ask different questions, and grow more confident in their understanding. Eventually, they become "story experts," eager to tell the tale back to you in their own words—a key step toward independent reading.

By spotlighting a single book all month long, we create space for that deeper connection. But that doesn't mean we stop with just one story.

To expand upon what we're doing, I also share thematically connected books to expand on the big ideas—whether it's handling emotions, exploring nature, or sparking imagination. These read-alikes keep the conversation going, build comprehension, and help your child see how stories can be linked by feeling, topic, or curiosity.

So this week, go ahead—curl up with Storm Trucks again. And when your child is ready for more, try one of the books in this curated list to keep the learning (and bonding) rolling.

1. Come On, Rain! by Karen Hesse

← Watch Read Aloud A lyrical, joyful celebration of a long-awaited summer rain. Great for pairing with your cloud-in-a-jar or rainmaker crafts—and perfect for talking about how nature brings relief and renewal.

2. Storm is Coming! by Heather Tekavec

← Watch Read Aloud A humorous story where barnyard animals misunderstand the warning about a storm. Sweet, silly, and a gentle way to talk about fear of the unknown.

3. The Rabbit Listened by Cori Doerrfeld

4. Flashlight by Lizi Boyd

Watch Read Aloud A wordless, imagination-rich exploration of shadows and light. A perfect pairing with your flashlight mindfulness activity and any nighttime play.

5. A Rainbow of My Own by Don Freeman

Flashlight Mindfulness: From Stormy Sky to Quiet Calm

A calming flashlight activity that helps kids imagine moving through a thunderstorm and into peaceful skies.

Supplies:

- A flashlight (one per child or to take turns)
- A darkened room or tent
- Optional: background storm sounds or soft music

Activity:

1. Start in the Storm. Say something like:

"The sky is dark and stormy. Let's pretend your flashlight is a brave truck driving through the storm."

Have them move their flashlight beam quickly—zigzags, circles, or bouncing motions like lightning and thunder.

2. Moving Through It:

Prompt:

"Now the storm is rumbling, but the trucks keep working. Move the light slower now, like it's pushing through rain and wind."

Add motions like "sweeping" the light back and forth or "digging through clouds."

3. Quieting the Sky:

Say:

"The storm is slowing down... Can you make your light move as gently as the breeze after rain?"

Encourage very slow movements now—gliding the beam softly like a truck rolling away.

4. Deep Breathing & Calm:

End with:

"Now the trucks are resting. The sky is quiet. Let's take deep breaths together while your light stays still."

Inhale and exhale slowly 3–5 times together. Let the flashlight beam "fade" by turning it off or dimming it if possible.

What's going on up there in those stormy skies?

Let's find out—with a fun and simple weather experiment you can do at home using just a few everyday items! Kids will love watching the "cloud" fill up and finally burst into rain, just like a real storm. This hands-on activity pairs perfectly with this month's



book, *Storm Trucks*, and helps children connect weather and water in a visual, memorable way.

Cloud in a Jar - A Simple Rain Experiment

You'll Need:

- A clear glass jar (or cup)
- Shaving cream
- Water
- Food coloring (blue works best)
- A spoon or dropper

Step-by-Step:

- 1. Fill the jar about ¾ full with water. This is the air.
- 2. Add shaving cream on top to make a fluffy "cloud."
- 3. In a small bowl or cup, mix food coloring with a little water. This is your rain.
- 4. Use a spoon or dropper to slowly drip the colored water onto the shaving cream.
- 5. Watch closely! When the "cloud" gets full, the rain falls into the water below!

What's Happening?

This shows how real clouds work!

- Clouds are made of tiny water droplets.
- When clouds get too heavy, the droplets fall down as rain.

This experiment shows how rain happens when clouds can't hold any more water!



RAINSTICK

DIY Egg Shakers

Make your own music with these easy egg shakers inspired by Clap for Classics on <u>YouTube!</u>

You'll Need:

- Plastic Easter eggs
- Tape (washi, duct, or masking tape)
- Fillers: rice, popcorn kernels, dried beans, etc.

How To:

- 1. Check for holes in the eggs. If there are any, tape over them on the inside to keep filler from leaking.
- 2. Add filler to one half of the egg (just a spoonful!).
- 3. Snap the egg shut and tape all the way around the seam to keep it secure.
- 4. Shake and play! Try different fillers to create different sounds.



Paper Bowl Drums



Inspired By Fantastic Fun & Learning

You'll Need:

- 2 paper bowls
- Stapler or tape
- (Optional) A spoonful of rice or beans
- Markers, stickers, or tape to decorate

How To Make It:

- 1. Put two bowls together (rim to rim).
- 2. Staple or tape around the edge to seal them.
- 3.(Optional) Add rice or beans inside before sealing for shaker sound.
- 4. Decorate the outside however you like!


Flashlight Shadow Play: Truck Stick Puppets

Supplies:

- Printable truck cutouts (below)
- Scissors
- Glue stick, glue dots, or tape
- Craft sticks, straws, or pencils
- Flashlight
- A dark room, tent, or blanket fort

Instructions:

- 1. Print & Cut— Print the truck silhouettes and cut out each one carefully.
- 2. Attach Handles—Use tape, glue dots, or a glue stick to attach each truck cutout to a craft stick, straw, or pencil.
- 3. Set the Scene—Go into a dark room or set up a cozy blanket fort.
- 4. Shine the Light—Turn on a flashlight and shine it toward a blank wall or ceiling.
- 5. Bring the Trucks to Life—Hold the puppets between the flashlight and the wall to cast big, bold shadows. Move them around to "drive," "dig," "dump," and act out scenes from Storm Trucks or make up your own stormy adventure!





Option 2: Flashlight Tube Projector

You'll Need:

- Printable truck cutouts (included)
- Scissors
- Glue stick, glue dot, or tape
- Empty toilet paper tube
- Plastic wrap (like Saran Wrap)
- Rubber band
- Flashlight
- Dark room, tent, or blanket fort



- 1. Cut out a truck from the printable sheet.
- 2. Stretch plastic wrap tightly over one end of the toilet paper tube.
- 3. Secure it with a rubber band.
- 4. Stick the truck cutout onto the center of the plastic wrap.
- 5. Turn off the lights and shine the flashlight through the open end of the tube.
- 6. Watch the truck shadow appear on the wall or ceiling!
- Bonus Tip: Make several tubes with different construction vehicles to switch easily.

Bonus: Rainbow Tube Projector

Create a glowing rainbow that shines on the wall using light and color!

→ This version uses permanent markers. Please have an adult help with the drawing step.

You'll Need:

- Empty toilet paper roll
- Clear packaging tape (wide works best)
- Permanent markers (red, orange, yellow, green, blue, purple)
- Scissors

Instructions:

- 1. Lay a piece of clear packaging tape across one end of the toilet paper tube. Wrap it around so it completely seals the opening. (You can layer a few strips to cover the full circle.)
- 2. With adult supervision, use permanent markers to draw a simple rainbow on the tape. Bright, bold stripes or arcs of color work best.
- 3. Wait a minute or two to let the marker ink dry. Avoid touching the tape while it's wet to prevent smudging.
- 4. Go into a dark room or crawl into a cozy blanket fort. Shine the flashlight through the open end of the tube. Watch your rainbow light up the wall or ceiling!



Pop-Up Rainbow Card

Supplies:

- Card stock or construction paper
- white paper
- Markers, watercolors or paints
- Scissors
- Glue Stick
- Blank envelope for gifting (optional)



Activity by Red Ted Art

Instructions:

1. Measure your rainbow width

Before decorating, place your white paper inside the folded card to see how wide your rainbow can be. Make a small mark—your rainbow shouldn't be wider than the card when folded shut.

2. Make your rainbow

Use markers, watercolors, or glue strips of colored paper in rainbow order. Fill the space between your marks with color! Let it dry completely if you used paint.

3. Cut out your rainbow

Trim away any extra white edges so you're left with just your colorful rainbow strip.

4. Fold it like an accordion

Start at one short end and fold the paper back and forth (like a fan), about $\frac{1}{2}$ inch per fold. This makes your rainbow "pop" when the card opens.

5. Glue one end inside the card

Open your folded card. Glue one end of the accordion rainbow to one side of the card—across the card, not along the fold. Leave room for writing and clouds!

6. Glue the other end and close the card

Now add glue to the top of the other end of the rainbow. Gently close the card and press. Let it dry fully before opening and closing.

7. Decorate!

Add clouds, faces, or drawings around your rainbow. Then write a message inside—something like:

"After every storm comes a rainbow!"

REACH Connection:

This craft is a great way to talk about how we can help others feel better—just like Axel helps his puppy in Storm Trucks.
